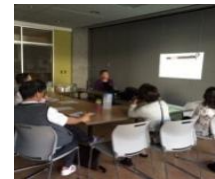

Community Workshops on Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) and Tuberculosis (TB)

The Canadian Ethnocultural Council's model of community engagement continues to work well with the full participation of selected trainers and communities in this project.

A total of 25 workshops were held on the topic of STIs and TB between September 15, 2015 and January 15, 2016 for each of the five communities (Chinese, East Indian, Egyptian, Filipino, and Vietnamese) in five cities (Calgary, Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, and Winnipeg) across Canada. Approximately 300 participants attended the workshops facilitated by CEC lead trainers. Overall, the workshops were rated very highly. Participants found that the workshops were very successful in increasing awareness and knowledge about both STIs and TB. The sessions themselves generated further interest and information about them was disseminated through local ethnic media (e.g., Vietnamese newspaper in Vancouver and Manitoba Times in Winnipeg).
